FRENCH NEGROES.

An important letter from a gentleman in Fayetteville, to the editors, dated 15th inst. follows: A letter received here yesterday, by a young gentleman of the Academy, from his father, a very respectable man in Georgetown, (S. C.) dated 11th inst. says:—"This town and neighborhood are all in great alarm, four French frigates from St. Domingo, were the whole of yesterday employed in landing brigand negroes at Mr. Alton's sea-shore plantation, Waccamaw; and it is said they have not landed less than 1000. The militia are marching from all directions against them. I presume those are the frigates that were some time ago at New-York, and finding that they could not effect their design there, steered round to take advantage of a more defenceless place."

FRENCH NEGROES.

We stop the press to publish the following. Extract of a letter from a gentleman in Georgetown, (S. C.) dated 15th Oct. to a gentleman in this place.
 "The infernal French are disgorging the whole of their wretched blacks upon our shores.

An express arrived this afternoon to the Brigadier General, with information that a French frigate was landing negroes about 32 miles from this place. Every inhabitant of the town was ordered to equip himself and march to oppose them; which they did this afternoon with the greatest cheerfulness, and I believe would have gone with more pleasure, had they to combat with the French."

FRENCH NEGROES.

Extract of a letter from a respectable gentleman in Georgetown, (S. C.) to a merchant in this city, dated the 15th inst.

"Three French frigates left the Hook the day we did, and we have just heard of their landing their negroes on Long-Bay. We are all summoned to turn out with the different companies, and the orders are, not to take a single negro, but shoot them all—we are informed they have landed about 1000; by tomorrow morning there will be soldiers enough at the place to prevent more landing—if they get scattered among our negroes; it will be a dreadful thing."

MORE OF THE FRENCH NEGROES.

Extract of a letter from a gentleman residing in the vicinity of Georgetown, (S. C.) to his friend in this town, dated 15th Oct. 1862.

"We expect to have the trouble of taking care of about a 1000 negroes, which the French have landed on our coast."

The sources from which we derive the intelligence under our mail head, respecting the attempt of the French to pollute our Southern Shores by landing the refractory negroes from their colonies, are too authentic to be doubted. Their views in this outrageous transaction, cannot be questioned; and should they succeed, the most dreadful consequences must ensue.—How long will the patience of our democrats bear with the insolence of that nation, and how many times must they be told, before they will believe, that the destruction of this country, ever since the reign of democracy commenced in France, has been their avowed design, and the object of their unceasing pursuit? Will they, with this glaring instance before them, with their eyes open, proceed to fill up their elections with men who have even avowed their attachment to that proud and insidious nation; and who have always been ready to second all their attempts to subject us to their malignant views?
